

School Safety Preparation for the 2022-2023 School Year

ENSURE SCHOOL SAFETY AND SECURITY COMMITTEE MEETS TO REVIEW EOP AND ADDRESS ANY CAMPUS SAFETY NEEDS.

THIS INCLUDES REVIEWING ACTIVE THREAT PLAN.

- City or county's office of emergency management – at least one representative
- The local police department or sheriff's office – at least one representative.
- From the board of trustees – the president and at least one other representative of the board.
- From the district – the superintendent and at least another designee, one being a district classroom teacher.
- Parents or guardians of currently enrolled students – at least two.
- If the district has an instructional partnership with an open-enrollment charter school – a member of the charter schools' governing body, or their designee.
- If the district has its own police department – at least one representative
